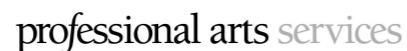

SPEAKERS

PRESIDENT ANOTE TONG, is serving his second term as President (Te Beretitenti) of Kiribati, after being re-elected in October last year. He also holds the cabinet portfolio of Foreign Affairs and Immigration. His constituency is Maiana Island, an outer island within sailing distance of Tarawa, the capital island. Educated in Kiribati before attending St Bede's College, Christchurch and graduating from Canterbury University with a BSc, he later gained a Masters in Economics from the London School of Economics.

Before entering politics in 1994, President Tong worked in the Kiribati government sector, the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat and a research and development unit at the University of the South Pacific, Fiji. He is noted as a leader in environmental and sustainability discussions, notably in the Pacific Islands Forum, with his country vulnerable to the impacts of climate change.

DR DAVID WRATT is the General Manager responsible for climate and climate change work at NIWA, Director of the New Zealand Climate Change Centre, Chair of the Royal Society's New Zealand Climate Committee, and a Bureau member of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC). David has been involved in national and international climate change research and assessment since the mid-1980s. His work has included collaborating with colleagues to develop regional climate change projections, preparing material to help Local Government staff identify climate change impacts and adaptation options, and contributing to IPCC climate change assessments.

ANAKE GOODALL is of Ngai Tahu (indigenous Maori) descent with diverse management experience from careers as a labour union delegate, a plant nurseryman, the manager of the Ngai Tahu's historical settlement process, and as an independent consultant to clients including the NZ government and a number of Maori tribes. He is particularly interested in change management and capacity building, organisational development, principled negotiations and international development issues.

A NZ Trustee of the Hillary Institute, Anake has an MBA, and a Masters of Public Administration from Harvard's John F Kennedy School of Government. He is also a New Zealand Harkness Fellow. In 2004 Anake returned to Ngai Tahu and has recently taken up the role of Chief Executive Officer.

DR NICK MARSH's focus is on providing key strategic advice, coaching, research processes and facilitation to CEO's and Executive Teams. He emigrated to NZ from Britain and retains strong links into the UK business scene. He has project experience across many sectors including energy, retail, television, manufacturing, science and research commercialisation, and small country innovation. A founding member of the Business School at Auckland University Nick was the Director of the Auckland MBA. He has recently spent three years on assignment in Melbourne building an Australian client practice, recently returning to Auckland.

Nick is widely known in the Australasian marketplace for his management books, keynotes, and his work with the NZ Foresight Project 1997-2000 which spawned 150 foresight projects across all business sectors and influenced the innovation paradigm in NZ. He has published many management articles and three business books Theory K- Excellence in Management, The All Star Company, and most recently Strategic Foresight- The Power of Standing in the Future.

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



DR RAJENDRA PACHAURI

is Director-General for The Energy and Resources Institute, which conducts research and provides professional support in the areas of energy, environment, forestry,

biotechnology and the conservation of natural resources. In 2002, he was elected Chairman of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, and has received many significant awards, including the Nobel Peace Prize in 2007 on behalf of the IPCC and in 2001, the Padma Bhushan by the president of India for his contributions to the environment.

Pachauri taught at Yale University's School of Forestry and Environmental Studies in 2000 as a McCluskey Fellow. In 1999, he was appointed by Japan to the Board of Directors of the Institute for Global Environmental Strategies, Environment Agency. He is also president of the India Habitat Centre. He has sat on various international and national committees and boards, including the International Solar Energy Society, the World Resources Institute Council, the International Association for Energy Economics, and the Asian Energy Institute.

He has also contributed to the Economic Advisory Council to the Prime Minister of India; the Panel of Eminent Persons on Power, the Ministry of Power; Delhi Vision - Core Planning Group; the Advisory Board on Energy, reporting directly to the prime minister; the National Environmental Council, under the chairmanship of the prime minister; and the Oil Industry Restructuring Group, 'R' Group. Pachauri earned an M.S. in industrial engineering, a Ph.D. in industrial engineering, and a Ph.D. in economics from North Carolina State University.



MATT PETERSEN,

Global Green USA President, CEO and board member, joined Global Green USA in 1994. Petersen has designed and led Global Green USA, the only

national environmental organization headquartered in greater Los Angeles, with a social entrepreneurial approach. He has helped develop and guide its growing programs of eliminating weapons of mass destruction; fighting climate change; promoting green building and renewable energy; and ensuring access to clean water for all of humanity. Matt is a representative to the Council of GCI, and Chairs the GCI Energy and Resource Efficiency Program. In the aftermath of the Gulf Coast hurricanes, he put forth a vision and mobilized resources to create the Global Green "Healthy Homes and Smart Neighborhoods" initiative which includes: the New Orleans Sustainable Design Competition with Jury Chair Brad Pitt resulting in the construction of the Holy Cross Project; the NOLA Green Schools Initiative funded by the Bush Clinton Katrina Fund; and work with Habitat for Humanity throughout the Gulf Coast to create more energy efficient housing.

Petersen has created two annual environmental awards programs – often presented with Mikhail Gorbachev -- entitled the Millennium Awards, held in Los Angeles, and the Designing A Sustainable World Awards, held in New York City. Matt is an advisor to the Leonardo DiCaprio Foundation and a Member of the Pacific Council on International Policy. He serves on the City of Santa Monica Environmental Task Force, the Environmental Media Association (EMA) advisory board and the Automotive X Prize Advisory Board.

Previously, Petersen has served as a Term Member of the Council on Foreign Relations, and as Executive Director of Americans for a Safe Future, where he helped lead a successful campaign to promote alternative radioactive waste policies. Before building and leading environmental organizations, Matt worked as a political campaign manager for candidates at the local, state, and federal level. He holds a BA in Political Science from California State University at Chico and a Masters in Public Administration from the University of Southern California. In 2008 Matt has been honoured as the Hillary Institute's inaugural Hillary Senior Fellow, a key international ambassador for our Leadership work on Climate Change Solutions, and with our domain expert partner organizations assisting us to identify potential Hillary Laureates.
